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Nurses as Advocates: A Holistic Approach to Palliative Care Learning objectives:

- Define palliative care and learn to identify patients who could benefit from a palliative approach

She has successfully supported interdisciplinary teams in addressing end-of-life care challenges, and has mentored and supervised both graduate and undergraduate nursing students.
